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ricky karim and spit nolan is an adventure themed access short story collection by bull naughton pratima mitchell and jenny alexander for year 5 p6 for guided and independant reading this book is part of streetwise

first published in 1986 following the warnock report schools attempted to integrate the teaching of children with special needs into ordinary classrooms many teachers had no experience of teaching children with special needs and the new developments were likely to pose a substantial challenge this book provides a guidance for inexperienced especially new teachers in how to teach children with special needs in ordinary classrooms an important feature of the book is realism the book grows out of the author s own experiences and research the author describes what really happens and bases his suggestions on practices which are likely to bring results

how children learn to read well and what kind of teaching helps them is a scarcely penetrated mystery this book is a fascinating and informative research report by a group of teachers who

set out to teach children who have failed to acquire a useful degree of literacy in it they discuss their experiences the authors are presenting evidence about a central and constant problem in education an essential kind of evidence which is often ignored because it is so difficult to collect and present the report presents enough case notes and recordings of lessons and discussions to allow readers to make their own interpretations alongside those of the writers highly informative about many of the central topics of teaching literacy it discusses children s motivation the influence of social and cultural background on learning and different methods of teaching reading

this book the first to focus exclusively on portfolio assessment is practical theoretical and broad in scope offering places to start rather than claiming to be definitive the articles all by teachers with considerable experience in using portfolio grading are free of jargon making sound composition and assessment theory available to every reader regardless of the level of writing taught

here are some of the very best short stories written for children over the last 250 years compiled by the well known children s writer and carnegie medalist jan mark this is the first anthology to trace how children s short stories evolved ranging from the publication of sarah fielding s the governess in 1749 to nadia wheatley s convict box in 1992 anyone who enjoys children s fiction whether young or old will find something to savor in the oxford book of children s stories fairy tales ghost stories adventures and escapades in and out of school every genre is included here peopled by good children and bad strict parents and kindly aunts kings and queens giants and enchanters mark includes work by 44 different authors including well known figures such as louisa may alcott christina rossetti rudyard kipling max beerbohm and carl sandburg leading modern writers such as philippa pearce richard kennedy nadia wheatley and jan mark herself plus many long forgotten tales that are still highly entertaining today chronologically arranged the anthology also serves as an introduction to the historical development of the children s short story providing insights into the way perceptions of childhood and contemporary attitudes have influenced writers of different periods but as jan mark s discriminating selection demonstrates the ingredients of a good children s story as well as the fictional tastes of children themselves have remained remarkably constant despite changes in style and outlook this is a collection to divert and surprise an ideal survey of the children s short story for parents professionals and especially for the children themselves

covering works as diverse as a historical survey of the alphabet book and an analysis of the young adult novels of judy blume this annotated bibliography draws together significant articles books and disseratations of children s literature criticism compiled from a wide variety of popular and scholarly sources children s literature provides a thorough and easy to use resource to this burgeoning field of study children s literature categorizes and assesses the critical response to fiction drama poetry and some nonfiction written for children between the

ages of one and sixteen the children s literature covered ranges in format and style from the picture book to the young adult novel the emphasis is on twentieth century children s literature although classics from earlier centuries have been included book jacket

no secondary teacher today is faced with such a demanding task as the teacher of english research has emphasized the importance of language to the whole intellectual emotional and social growth and report after report has pushed the frontiers of english further onwards the teacher of english requires a number of skills a depth of theory a diversity of knowledge and a familiarity with a wide range of literature which is truly daunting this book meets a real need and will be valued by all teachers of english from the student on school practice to the experienced teacher anxious to survey all aspects of current work in the 12 16 age range it is essentially a practical book arising out of the editors strongly felt needs for a comprehensive book which would translate the radical rethinking of the fifties and sixties into detailed descriptions of successful work they therefore invited a large number of the most experienced and well known teachers of english to write about some aspects in which they had special expertise and experience although written independently these articles show a concern for finding meaningful and realistic ways of helping the individual pupil s grasp of language for his personal and intellectual needs they share a dislike of the artificial textbook exercise and an ability to invent instead methods of prompting the individual to talk write and read more fully there is a full consideration of the place of modern media in the classroom a lively exploration of the possibilities of drama as an integral part of english teaching and an unusually practical section of ways of encouraging wide reading the individual articles are linked by a perceptive commentary from the editors and each contributor has been given space enough to convey the detail of his subject so that this book of effective classroom practice not mere generalization

marx and marxism supposedly dead and buried seem to find ways of staying alive this collections of articles explores how some of these ideas might offer useful ways at looking at children s literature contributions include views of children s books and periodicals written in britain during the great war and a paper on walter benjamin

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
